



NZ Garden Trust Newsletter December 2016

December has come in a blur, so much happening and for those of us in the northern South Island and lower North Island not helped by the earth deciding to rearrange itself once again! We do live in an extraordinarily active earthquake zone, the entire Pacific Rim seems to be having 1000 year earthquakes every few weeks! The amazing thing is that plants seem to love the movement, and the growth this year in this garden is huge, helped of course by more rain than we have had for the last 2 summers!

On the Trust front, we do want you all to know that at last we seem to be making more progress with actual garden visitors, and I am including this brief from Linda Larson who visited here recently. Linda calls herself the travelling gardener, and has visited many gardens around the world, I had asked her a number of questions around how helpful the NZGT was to her in her planning of gardens to visit, which she answers here and I think is self-explanatory.

"First, we did use the NZGT site for a great deal of our itinerary planning. We also used the lonely planet guidebook, google maps (we zoom in on the area and look for gardens) and the site gardenvisit.com out of England.

Then we printed out the trust list (picked up a printed copy when we first saw one here) and we used the print copy to keep track. I then used the NZGT site every evening on my laptop to double

check information in more detail. I would go from the NZGT site to the garden's website for more info. It was enormously helpful to have the links for email and website within that document.

Because I'm using an international phone plan I didn't use the NZGT site on my mobile device often because of the data charges, but it does seem to work well.

Re: the grading for the gardens, we did use that as a guide, looking mainly for the 4, 5, & 6 rankings for our tour. We have been to 28 of the gardens so far, (we have two more weeks in country) and only two have seemed not quite up to the ranking they were given. All the rest seemed spot on.

We did visit all the public botanic gardens we could find on our route, some are, of course, also NZGT listed. We did a week in Taranaki for the Powerco festival and visited 32 gardens there, some of which were also NZGT.

My thoughts re: what could be done better?

We have booked all our accommodations thru Airbnb. We specifically chose those properties that had gardens of their own. Many had quite lovely private gardens. We have stayed in 20 different properties to date. I would say 15 of those gardeners didn't know about the NZGT!!! I know two of the gardeners have since travelled to gardens I told them about, that they lived very near to and hadn't visited. But isn't that often

the case? So perhaps more local promotion would be in order?

The other improvement would be signage, even if there aren't directional signs as many people use the gps apps to map the way but a better garden name sign instead of just a two number designation somewhere on a mailbox tilted downward. ;-) For some of the larger gardens a bit of directional signage, or map is always very much appreciated. Talking with the gardeners is so nice, hearing their stories, the successes are evident, their failures endearing.

As to the NZ gardens being superb!!! Yes I believe they are excellent, fabulous, lovely, diverse, loved by their gardeners and ever so wonderful to visit. Ironically one of the reasons is while we were wandering about we had the place to ourselves. No big tour groups, no masses of folks taking selfies and blocking the path. Selfish I know but the joy of leisurely exploring, hearing the birds, is just not possible in famous English gardens.

So, I think I've answered all your questions. I don't believe we will ever have a more wonderful garden visit trip than these weeks in NZ because of the things I mentioned. I've written about several of the gardens on my website. I have more to stories to come. We are just finishing up in Napier, and have a few more days north before we end up in Auckland, and hope to see Ayrilies and several others in that area.

All the best in your work with the NZGT. It is a very good thing."
